For those of you that wait till the last minute to put the bike away for the winter, here are a few tips from George & Carol Jorgensen of Riders of the Cross in Tomahawk.

Winterizing Tips

With winter quickly approaching, many of us face the chore of winterizing our

bikes. However, not everyone knows what is involved in this process. If you ask

any number of fellow riders, you'll probably get several different answers of what to do. Most will agree that the procedure listed in most owners and repair manuals is quite effective. Whether you ride a Harley, Honda, or any of the multitude of performance oriented American Vtwin bikes on the market, the recommendations are basically the same.

First off, you should add a fuel stabilizer to your fuel tank. It is always best to follow the directions for application on the product itself. Most stabilizers include additives that help to eliminate any water concentration in the fuel. Also make sure to top off the fuel to reduce the chances of condensation inside the tank due to temperature changes during storage. Then you should run the engine to operating

temperature then change the oil & filter. Next you want to turn off the fuel flow to the carburetor with the petcock. Then you need to drain the fuel from the bowl of the carburetor. The easiest way to do this is to start the bike making sure the fuel is still shut off, and let it run until it dies from running out of fuel.

If your bike is fuel injected, you will not be able to perform the last two steps because you cannot turn off the fuel. Don't be concerned though, the fuel injectors are not as susceptible to gum and varnish as a carburetor with fuel sitting stagnant for several months.

If you don't already have a battery tender installed on your bike, it is a very sound

investment. If you do have one, you will want to store your bike with the tender plugged in and keeping the battery charged. You could also remove the battery from the bike and put a 1.5 amp trickle charger on it. It's best if it is self-regulating so as not to overcharge the battery.

Lastly, you should make sure the bike is thoroughly clean and dry before storing it away. This will help prevent that road grime from damaging the painted surfaces and keep rust from developing on unpainted areas. You can apply a light film of oil to any exposed metals to aid in rust prevention also. If you choose to cover your bike, make sure the cover is made of a breathable material that also won't scratch the finishes. If the cover is not breathable, it can promote condensation.
