

Kustom Corner A Monthly Column by Mark Prosser

What can I expect to pay for a custom paint job? This is a question with ten different answers. People ask constantly, how much do you charge for a flame job? It is a legitimate question, but one that can be frustrating for a painter. First, we have to ask what kind of flame job are you looking for. Maybe traditional hot rod flames, tribal flames, seaweed flames, layered flame, candy flames, different color faded flames and is this flame job on a bike or a hot rod or a 40 foot boat? And will the flames be drop shadowed and pinstriped and



we can go on and on and on. Just the type of vechicle can make a big difference in price. Hot Rods are expensive because there is not a flat panel anywhere. They are simply much harder to paint. I tell people it's hard to make something so round, straight. Painting panels with a lot of shape is a bit different than a flat panel. People see really wicked paint jobs at shows or in the magazines and want that on their bike or rod. You can have it but cool stuff is expensive. Let's take years of experience and the art aspect out of it for a moment and just look at the simple fact that a sprayable gallon of top shelf clear is around \$300.00 and the last bike I painted had almost 15 hours of polishing time alone. So that being said, a straight color paint job with very little body work should cost about 20 to 30 hours labor and around \$200.00 for materials. If the shop rate is \$50.00 an hour that's \$1700.00, sounds like a lot hugh? There are also specialty products we can get into that cost \$100.00 an ounce and more. I recently had new tires changed on my van and the shop rate was \$72.87 per hr. My accountant was paid \$125.00 for 30 minutes to plug numbers in the program? So is high end paint (art) work really expensive? I mean gas is \$4.00 a gallon. ALSA Company makes a color shifting heat reactive paint that is \$1500.00 a quart. So sometimes you can't get what you see at the shows unless you want to pay for what it's worth. Another common question is "will my paint job be show quality?" Painters do different levels of paint jobs, At PROSSERPAINT we only know one way to do paint work and that is the best I can possibly do every time. If "show" quality is what you are after be ready to pay for it. Sometimes I find it insulting when someone asks if I can do it cheaper because it's not a show piece and I can't afford that. I just don't know how to do "cheap" work? I always try very hard to work within client's budgets, but the bottom line is time is time and some of the paint jobs you see and want require lots of time. I grew up hearing "the guy over there will do it cheaper" I have no problem with that he knows exactly what his work is worth. I feel I'm priced according to the level of the work. In one of my meetings with the famous Vegas striper Bob Spina (who was mentored by Von Dutch and Ed Roth) I watched him striped a ranchers new truck from head to toe and when he was done the price was over \$400.00. and the customer said he would gladly pay because it was amazing to watch but "you've only worked on it an hour and a half" And Spina quickly replied "you are not paying me for the hour and a half it took, your paying me for the 50 years of experience it took to get that fast and clean"you have to pay for the experience of the artist

> as with any craft or trade. I know airbrush artist the charge \$100.00 an hour and one recently finished a job that he had 150 hours of work into it. Yes you can spend thousands and thousands of dollars on mural work. Paint work can be very expensive, but don't let that deter you from getting art work on your piece. As a business owner and artist I feel it is my responsibil-

ity to be creative enough to get you something different with in your budget. There are a lot of cool options to separate your bike or rod from the rest of them.
