Second, I would like to address something that I have found out while talking to many of you over the past year. We may get the same response at the grocery store and the restaurant, it's not just the religious people. They fear what they don't know or understand. I agree that



church people should be more accepting, but, then again, we are talking about people. There are some churches that are accepting of others, regardless of differences. Keep looking; don't get discouraged; you'll find people who will share the love of God with you. Remember, you are people, too.

That brings me to the third point I wanted to make. I have talked to many bikers over the past year, and most of them readily admit that they know they are bad. Many will even acknowledge that they are sinners, using a religious term from their childhood. The ones I am concerned about are those who seem to think they are too far gone for God to care about them. They believe that they have crossed a line, a point of no return, and that there is no way that they could ever be accepted by Christians, or God for that matter. I want you who think those things to know that this is not the case. As long as you are still alive at this moment, there is hope. The Bible tells us that "all have sinned." That means that the religious people going to church down the road are in the same boat with you. Of course, there are some sinful acts that are much worse than others, and there are some people who sin more than others do, but from God's point of view, a sinner is a sinner no matter how much or how little he has sinned. From the lofty height of God's throne, the petty liar and the gross murderer stand equally small. Both deserve "eternal damnation" according to the Word of God. The point is that all sin carries equal weight with God, and mercy and grace are available to all sinners, no matter how sinful.
